LETTER FROM OUR CEO

CDC of Tampa is 30 years old! This moment in time serves to illustrate how, when we work collaboratively, we can create positive and lasting change.

Our donors, board members and staff have admirably responded to the unpredictable circumstances of this year with tenacity and enthusiasm for the benefit of our Tampa Bay area communities. Despite the innumerable difficulties caused by the pandemic that brought into focus and worsened the issues of inequality and disparity, our devoted mission to ensure lasting positive change persisted. The immense generosity of our supporters allowed us to provide vital assistance to those in need. With the assistance of county and state leadership, in addition to many other non-profit organizations, businesses, and philanthropic partners, our funds and resources were allocated to generate the greatest positive impact.

Particularly in our most disadvantaged neighborhoods, difficulties arose in accessing resources such as the internet, food, and healthcare. In addition, more than one-third of black renters in Tampa were spending more than half of their income on housing - a far higher proportion than any other racial or ethnic group. This illustrates the enormity of the problem that still needs to be tackled.

This year, however, has reaffirmed our belief in the resilience of our residents which propels CDC of Tampa to become even more stronger than ever...with a firmer dedication to helping the Tampa Bay area. We lead this charge through our partnership with Fifth Third Bank's 'Empowering Black Futures' neighborhood program, which is designed to ensure housing stability, support of black-owned businesses, and a thriving workforce. In addition, our HOPE program (Hiring and Opportunities for Procurement in East Tampa) is in place to help East Tampa residents find job opportunities. HOPE also connects small business owners, seeking to supply goods and services, with corporations and large businesses.

12,341 trained through our Workforce Development Center with 72% being hired by Tampa Bay Companies. We are putting residents to work through career readiness skills, certification training, job coaching and job placement assistance.

164 Single Family Homes built, **72** homes rehabbed, **373** rental units erected, and **187,098** square feet of commercial space developed. We are revitalizing local neighborhoods through commercial and residential development, rehabilitation, and other community investments. Through its homebuyer education, CDC created **1,176** new homeowners and allowed an additional **1,875** families to keep their homes through foreclosure prevention.

Assisted over **1,235** youth to graduate high school and matriculate to colleges and universities around the country. We are developing tomorrow's leaders through mentoring and academic support, career readiness skill-building, financial literacy, and volunteerism.

30th Anniversary Fundraising Gala Raises over \$200K to Support CDC of Tampa's Community Comprehensive Development Strategies

Each fall, CDC of Tampa hosts its annual fundraising gala to raise funds to help support affordable housing, workforce development, and youth empowerment programs in Tampa Bay communities. More than 430 people attended this 30th Anniversary Celebration and a total of \$207k was raised (including over \$2,000 from an online auction.)

The program featured appearances by U.S. Representative Kathy Castor and Mayor Jane Castor. Medical doctor, Ghino Francois, spoke about his life-changing experiences from being involved in CDC of Tampa's youth programs. Dave Jordan, from Omni Public, was the emcee and several elected officials, community residents and corporate executives were in attendance.

Helping to Provide Employment & Trainings

CDC of Tampa was awarded \$200K for the third consecutive year from USAA to support the company's Pre-Apprenticeship Training to Hire Program (P.A.T.H). Participants in these programs receive in-class and hands-on training that will help them develop work-related skills that makes them more likely to be accepted into an apprenticeship. The trades not only provide solid wages and benefits but also offer a career path to follow. In addition to helping them acquire the necessary technical knowledge and skills, the P.A.T.H Program also places great emphasis on the student's personal development.

From 2019-2022, USAA committed \$50 million to nonprofit organizations to help improve racial equality and positively address the employment, educational and economic disparities that exist within communities of color and low-income military communities. The goal of their targeted contributions is to help close gaps across education and job training, employment, and income disparity.

Helping to Sustain Housing Affordability in the Bay Area

With a grant from Hillsborough County, CDC of Tampa was able to purchase and rehab Armature Place Apartments. This new venture will help increase the amount of affordable housing options across the county amidst a housing shortage, which will help lower costs for residents.

"We know that creating affordable housing benefits everyone in the county by stimulating local economic growth, but it also creates opportunities for Bay Area residents to have equitable access to safe, quality, affordable housing for their families ... making for stable and secure living and upward mobility," said Coney.

"This was an amazing event that allowed community leaders and professionals the opportunity to mentor young men in high school and teach them the skills to become better men, fathers, husbands, and community leaders," said David Jones, event coordinator. "These young men were not only provided an opportunity to gain skills, but they walked away with a brand-new business suit."

Jones shared that there was an immediate self-esteem boost for the boys in dressing like professionals and looking the part that they will play in their future lives. "That confidence transcends their current status, and it's our hope that it changes the trajectory of the future they envisioned for themselves." said Jones.

This powerful event highlighted the contributions of women who have paved paths in their careers and community. Hosted at the Museum of Science and Industry, Alexandria Andrade the Sisterhood Summit's Program Coordinator also honored two volunteers (Denise James, CDC Board Member and Darlene Johnson, former CDC Board Member) by giving each lady their own crown.

RESIDENTIAL EVICTIONS:

Emergency Rental Assistance is Available



"People in our community are desperate for help, as they rebound to gain employment, in the face of unprecedented rent increases. The partnership with United Way allows us to address and help resolve a major issue that would otherwise lead to increased homelessness. Ultimately, our Rental Navigator is helping to bring hope and restore peace of mind to residents that need it the most."

Congress has passed two rounds of emergency rental assistance funding totaling about \$46.5 billion. However, one of the greatest challenges for renters to get approved for assistance is the process of completing and submitting the required documentation. As a result, we are staffed with a Rental Navigator, April Pryor, who helps tenants through the maze of federal aid relief.

CDC of Tampa's community partnership, with United Way Suncoast, is designed to help individuals (or households) who are behind on rent or expecting to fall behind on rent; have a household income at 80% or below the Area Median Income

and have experienced financial hardship since March 2020. United Way was able to secure funding to hire Rental Navigators by drawing the \$3 million for this effort from a \$20 million grant the charity received from MacKenzie Scott, the billionaire philanthropist and former wife of Amazon founder Jeff Bezos.

said Pryor. "Sometimes what people need is a step up, and that is exactly what the partnership with United Way Suncoast does for our residents."

GIRLS AREN'T FIREFIGHTERS

How CDC of Tampa is Making Firefighting More Inclusive

"One of the disparities that youth face is unemployment. Therefore, we focus on career exploration, industry-recognized certifications, and college preparedness. It is critically important to introduce our youth to traditional and nontraditional careers, and to careers that allow their diversity to be celebrated and welcomed." ~ Ernest Coney



According to the National Fire Protection Association, women make up less than 10 percent of the fire service nationwide. To encourage high school students to explore all employment options, we host both a Youth Leadership Movement (YLM) Program and a Fire Introduction Resources and Education (FIRE) Academy designed to help participants envision themselves in a variety of roles and careers in the future.







Firefighter Amber Nicole Brooks is one of CDC's YLM Program alumni who has solidified the motto, "If you can see it, you can achieve it!" Born in February of 1993 with her eyes "wide" open, Brooks has literally discovered life through 20/20 vision. Brooks became an all-star athlete and during high school, she was awarded an internship with U.S. Representative Kathy Castor. She also developed a love for cross country athletics which resulted in Brooks being able to secure a full track and field scholarship to North Carolina Central University...where she achieved records in cross country competitions. After college, Brooks obtained employment with Hillsborough County School Board, Florida State Department of Children & Families, Hillsborough County Tax Collector's Office, and was finally sworn in as a Certified Fire Fighter on May 2, 2022, with Hillsborough County Fire Rescue.

We not only focus on exposure to careers, but we also offer enrichment opportunities in support of the exceptional young leaders' drive for knowledge and their desire to make a difference in the world.

"Becoming a member of CDC's YLM Program taught me how to appreciate things and the meaning of giving back. It also taught me how to love people no matter their financial backgrounds," said Brooks. "I have dedicated my life to empowering others, and as a result of the CDC YLM Program I understand what it means to be a mentor."
